Marx (1843a) rejects the notion of individual human rights and Bauer's call for political emancipation of the religious person Marx points out that political free-dom does not ensure individual freedom (Engle, 2008) Guarantees to religious freedom are implicit in rights more generally: that is, a person has the right of equality, liberty, security and property For Marx, the right to

Karl Heinrich Marx (5 May 1818 - 14 March 1883) was a German philosopher, economist, historian, sociologist, political theorist, journalist and socialist revolutionary Born in Trier, Germany, Marx studied law and philosophy at university He married Jenny von Westphalen in 1843 Due to his political publications, Marx became stateless and lived in exile with his wife and children in London

Marx's Critique of the Gotha Programme as follows: "Equal right" [of everyone to an equal product of labour] we certainly do have here [ie in the first phase of communism]; but it is still a "bourgeois right", which, like every right, pre-supposes inequality Every right is an application of an equal measure to different people who in fact are not alike, are not equal to one

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
